PREFACE

This Standard was prepared by the Standards Australia Committee on Electrical Equipment in Coal Mines and supersedes AS 1299—1989, *Electrical Equipment for Coal Mines—Flameproof restrained plugs and receptacles*. It is intended for the guidance of manufacturers, users, regulatory authorities and associated interests and for use with other related Australian Standards and relevant mining regulations.

Major changes are as follows:

- (a) Incorporation of all amendments to the 1989 edition.
- (b) Change of material tensile strength requirement of Clause 2.3 from 450 MPa to 220 MPa for parts other than the engaging portion of the plug case.
- (c) Provision for six-pin plug and receptacles.
- (d) Reference to AS 3573—Electrical equipment for coal mines—Glossary of terms.
